Price given \$165,000. - 42 acres land (only half to be used: to sell as lots? Feb. /07) 24 acres water lots. T.R.C. denies any "direct" association Nov.10 1906 Named Toronto Park Co. 70 King St. West Architects Connor, Clarke and Monds Feb.11 1907 Selected name Scarboro' Beach in contest Mar.30 1907 (\$100 award) won by G. Turner, 1236 King St. West April 1907 Estimated expenditure on Park is \$500,000. May 17 1907 T.R.C. commences building loop in park (to loop back via Leuty Ave.) and terminating service to east, but is halted by City Engineer. T.R.C. is removing Munro Park loop, hence threatens to halt service at Woodbine Ave. May 20 1907 Permission granted for loop (to loop on west side of Howard Ave.) but stub line to east not considered to be permanent by T.R.C. (since outside city limits). June 1, 1907 -Park opened by Mayor Coatsworth

First aeroplane flight contracted for public exhibition held by Charles Foster Willard

in his "Golden flyer". on Sept. 7 & 11).

Sept.2, 1909 -

1910 - Toronto Park Company into liquidation.

1911 - T.R.C. takes over as Park owners under name of Scarboro' Securities.

Dec.13,1912 - T.R.C. closes its streetcar operation east of Maclean Ave.

Mar.1,1913 - T. & Y. RR operates "stub" section as extra fare service.

Dec.14,1914 - "Stub line" rebuilt by City as double track in fall of 1914 and T.R.C. forced to extend through service.

Sept.1920 - Carbarn built at S.E. corner of Park

July,1922 - Streetcar loop removed.
Park acquisition rejected by T.T.C. **

Sept.12,1925- Park closed at end of day. (Saturday) Amusements sold.

Land sold for housing to the Provident Investment Company.
Earl and Leslie Price built duplexes.
